Accommodating Growth in the Capital Region - Growth is the same for all municipalities.

Growth can mean many things. Growth for a city is different in many ways when compared to county growth. For cities, growth can be viewed as adjusting boundaries to acquire additional land to accommodate an ever increasing population and employment base.

For counties, an increase in population and employment base rarely requires boundary adjustments since there is plenty of land on reserve and room to grow. County growth can be seen as an increase or diversification of economic development that can be accommodated within its existing boundaries.

While accommodating growth in a city and a county are different, both types of growth are necessary to support a successful Capital Region. Edmonton will continue to work on behalf of the region's sustainability.

Growth in Leduc County and City of Leduc.

Leduc County and the City of Leduc will still have plenty of room to grow if Edmonton's proposed annexations get approved.

Edmonton's annexation proposals account for roughly 6 percent of Leduc County's land mass. Should the proposals be approved, Leduc County would still have over 600,000 acres of land, including some land that has been targeted for future [regional growth](#) by the Province.

The City of Leduc just completed a successful annexation to accommodate its future growth. In the very long term future, City of Leduc would still have the option to expand their boundaries even further.

Edmonton, like the City of Leduc and the Towns of Beaumont and Devon, is pursuing annexation to ensure homes and places of work for our future residents.
