



NEIGHBOURHOOD DESCRIPTION

Kameyosek is one of the 26 neighbourhoods of Mill Woods. The Government of Alberta assembled the Mill Woods land bank in 1970. Mill Woods was named for Mill Creek which crossed the area, and for the groves of Parkland forest trees that stood there. By 1971, a development plan had been prepared by the City of Edmonton. The City began to purchase the land, subdivide it and sell residential and commercial building lots. Most of residential development in Kameyosek was built in the 1970s.

Kameyosek is bounded on the south by 28 Avenue, east by 66 Street, west by Mill Woods Road and 34 Avenue to the North. Lakewood Road (North and East) bisects the neighbourhood. Pathways extend out into the neighbourhood from the park and education facilities. Lakewood Community League includes the neighbourhoods of Kameyosek, Tipaskan and Meyonohk. The community league was formed in 1978.

Located near the centre of Mill Woods, Kameyosek contains a mixture of land uses. There are a mix of dwelling types in Kameyosek, including single-detached homes and multiple unit structures and apartments. Higher density residential development is clustered around the central school site and along the collector roadway that passes through the neighbourhood. A small commercial plaza is located in the southwest corner of the neighbourhood.

In the Cree language, Kameyosek means ‘the beautiful’.


