Salute to Excellence Medallion



The impressive gold medallion on stage is the visual symbol for the Salute to Excellence Hall of Fame. The medallion made its debut at the 2012 Hall of Fame induction and symbolizes the high level of achievement of each Hall of Fame inductee.

Professor Tim Antoniuk, a respected Edmonton designer and professor at the University of Alberta's Department of Art and Design, was responsible for the design and fabrication of the medallion. He incorporated the distinctive Salute to Excellence logo, designed in 2006 by Jacqui Dobbe, a student of the University of Alberta Department of Art and Design.

The logo includes a stylized pyramid, which represents the distinctive architecture of Edmonton's City Hall. The three marks represent the three areas of excellence recognized in the Hall of Fame – Arts & Culture, Community Service and Sports. These three marks also take the form of a bear claw swipe, the Cree symbol for "good fortune."

The City of Edmonton is fortunate indeed in the excellence of its citizens, but most especially those who are inducted into the Hall of Fame each year. They are Edmonton's pure gold!

Arts & Culture Hall of Fame

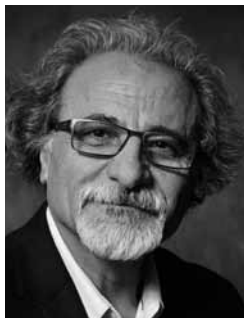

Jalal Barzanji

Artist



Since he arrived in Canada as a United Nations sponsored refugee, Jalal Barzanji has become known not only for his extraordinary talents as a poet, essayist and champion of freedom of speech for all writers, but also as a tireless community worker. Born in Kurdistan, Jalal was working as a journalist, poet and cultural worker in northern Iraq when, during the regime of Saddam Hussein, he was imprisoned and tortured for two years for his political beliefs. After fleeing Iraq, he applied for permanent residency in

Canada and arrived in Edmonton with his family in 1998.

During this time of transition, Jalal was and still remains an active writer, reader and presenter. Jalal joined the Edmonton Stroll of Poets in 2001, and the Writers Guild of Alberta and PEN Canada in 2007. That same year, he was named the First International Edmonton-PEN Writer-in-Exile and during his term he worked as a writing coach and mentor from his offices at the Edmonton Public Library and the University of Alberta. During part of the following year, he was Writer-in-Residence at the Berton House in Dawson City. Jalal's literary memoir, *The Man in Blue Pyjamas*, was translated from Kurdish into English and was published by the University of Alberta Press to rave reviews. It received several honours, including the Alberta Book Awards Lois Hole Award for Editorial Excellence. It was also honoured by 'A Year of Reading the World.' The University of Alberta Press recently published *Trying Again to Stop Time*, a translated selection from Jalal's seven Kurdish books of poetry.

Just two years after his arrival, Jalal founded the Canadian Kurdish Friendship Association to help integrate newcomers into the community. He personally worked with youth involved in gangs, mobilized Kurdish seniors to support each other, and mentored many young leaders in Edmonton's Kurdish community. He has also been deeply involved with the Multicultural Health Brokers Cooperative as a community worker/advocate. Jalal is known in Edmonton's multicultural community for his quiet yet powerful visionary leadership.

"When we use our words together, writers are stronger than armies and dictators. When we write, there is no cost in blood or tears. If we defend one another's freedom, we can make the world more peaceful, more beautiful for everyone. That is our purpose as writers. That is why we exist."

Heather C. Bedford-Clooney

Artist/Builder



Gifted voice teacher, choral conductor and music administrator Heather Bedford-Clooney will tell you that perhaps her greatest gift is her seemingly unlimited energy. Her CV confirms that talent plus energy have been a formidable combination in her life.

Heather has been with the Edmonton Columbian Choirs for 38 years, 20 as Artistic Director. She began conducting the Columbian Girls' Choir and now conducts her women's choir, *Chanteuses*, which has twice been a finalist in the Canadian Amateur Choir Competition. In 2012, in partnership with Sacred Heart Church of the First Peoples, she formed an inner city choir, which she co-conducts. She is Vice President of the Alberta Music Festival Association and the conductor with the Festival Singers in Sherwood Park. She also serves as the Executive Director of the Shean Piano and Strings Competition, the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals, and the Edmonton Kiwanis Music Festival. She is Past President of the Association of Canadian Choral Communities, the Alberta Choral Federation, Music Alberta, and Opera Nuova. She was also musical director of many musicals at Salisbury Composite High School, where she taught for 35 years.

In 2008, Heather received the Alberta Choral Federation Richard Eaton Award for a life time of service to choral music in Alberta.

Among Heather's strengths is her ability to encourage and motivate others. Many of her students and choristers have become conductors, teachers and performers. Heather's willingness to take unpaid gigs that promote the arts/music/choral community cements her reputation as a builder. She made World Music a component of the Edmonton Kiwanis Music Festival in 2014. She was also instrumental in bringing the National Music Festival of Canada to Edmonton for an almost unprecedented two years in a row (2015 and 2016).

"I am always very surprised and honoured when someone asks me to do something, so I say yes. Then I figure out how to fit it in. I realized as a young girl that you never give away without getting back far more in return."

Catherine Crowston

Artist/Builder



The Art Gallery of Alberta (AGA) is both an architectural showpiece and the embodiment of the successful transformation of The Edmonton Art Gallery into a major Canadian cultural institution with international reach. Catherine Crowston, Executive Director and Chief Curator of the AGA, has been at the heart of the organization throughout the process. Catherine is recognized within the arts community and beyond as one of the leading public art gallery and museum directors in Canada, as well as an initiator

of innovative and enlightening exhibition projects and programs.

In a position that is often transitory as curators move on to other opportunities, Catherine has chosen to remain in Edmonton for the past 17 years. She has overseen the Gallery through its transition, including the move from the original building to the interim gallery at Enterprise Square; participated in the planning and development of the new building; and successfully implemented a clear vision for the AGA.

"It's not often one has the opportunity to envision a new facility and expanded program like this, and the transformation of our role in the community. This is what has kept me here."

Catherine oversees the *Alberta Biennial of Contemporary Art*, an extraordinarily successful exhibition series organized by the AGA that, every two years, showcases a cross-section of the art being made in the province. Her vision has contributed to the positive perception of the Edmonton arts community elsewhere in the world, and she has brought a broad critical eye and an enthusiasm for what great art was and what it will be.

"We try to represent the diversity of the creative practice of artists living here and from abroad. We are not promoting one idea of what art should be, but presenting the multiplicity of its possibilities."

Todd Janes

Artist/Builder



One name that has been consistent in Edmonton's vibrant arts community over the past 25 years has been Todd Janes. Now in his 19th year as Executive Director of Latitude 53 Contemporary Visual Culture, Alberta's oldest and largest artist-run centre, Todd is known for his enthusiasm, energy, and talent for making things happen.

As curator, writer, performer, or administrator, Todd is an innovator who puts thoughts into actions.

Just one example is the internationally recognized *Visualeyez*, Canada's first and only annual festival of performance art, founded by Todd and now entering its 16th year. The event attracts performance artists from around the world and has put Edmonton on the map for this genre.

Since 2010, Todd has curated hundreds of projects, including the *Incubator* series at Latitude 53, a weekly summer exhibit that features work-in-progress by emerging artists who are taking artistic risks. With Todd's vision, Latitude 53 has initiated many partnerships with schools, ethno-cultural and LGBTQ communities, and social justice sectors. He has championed programming that moves beyond gallery walls into our communities, creating space to engage the breadth of Edmonton's diversity.

Beyond his administrative talents, Todd maintains an active creative practice as artist and advocate. In this capacity, he has represented Edmonton at festivals and galleries in Vancouver, Victoria, Calgary, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, and St. John's. He has also served as an officer on numerous boards and advisory committees, including the Editorial Board of *Muse* (Canadian Museums Association), the National Association of Artist-Run Centres, the Alberta Association of Artist-Run Centres, the Collective of Canadian Performance Art Curators, and Performance Creation Canada, to name only a few. He has received an Alberta Centennial Medal and a Maclab Award for Excellence in Arts Management.

"I believe people are social and want to connect with each other in meaningful ways. Artists create works to begin a conversation and I am deeply honoured and humbled by the thousands of conversations I have been able to incite and the environments I have helped build for Edmontonians in the past, now and into our future."

Marjorie Bencz, CM

Community Builder



Marjorie Bencz started as a volunteer with Edmonton's Food Bank in 1987 and joined the administration shortly thereafter. She was then appointed to the position of Executive Director and the rest is history.

Today, she oversees a food and operating budget of \$20 million, a staff of 34, and more than 50,000 volunteer hours — which supports more than 16,000 people through hamper programs and 410,000 meals and snacks monthly. Additionally, she works with donors

and 214 partner organizations. More than 1,100 food drives and fundraisers are held each year to support the Food Bank.

Marjorie is acknowledged as an outstanding leader in the food banking community across Canada. Her past roles include membership in and Chair of the Board of Directors of Food Banks Canada (formerly the Canadian Association of Food Banks). She is also a founding member and Board member of the Alberta Food Bank Network Association.

One story in particular symbolizes Marjorie's work with Edmonton's Food Bank. In 2006, she was invested into the Order of Canada as being a voice for the poor and working poor in fighting hunger in Canada.

"When I got back to Edmonton, we took the medal around and shared it with our volunteers. One gentleman held it in his hand and said: 'We have an Order of Canada!' I loved his use of the word 'we'. It's true – our work is collaborative and it is about being a team."

Marjorie has received many other distinguished awards over the years for going above and beyond her dedication to the Food Bank and those in need. They include the Queen's Diamond & Gold Jubilee Medals, YWCA Woman of Distinction, Global Television Woman of Vision, and Grant MacEwan College Distinguished Alumni Award.

"I am very fortunate and very spoiled, to be truthful. I have had staff and volunteers with me for a long time. I have a committed Board. Many Edmontonians are engaged and want to make a meaningful contribution to our community. The Food Bank has developed excellent relationships with people and organizations. Many of our supporters we see regularly while other friends we see only once a year. It has been a very special journey."

David Majeski

Community Leader



Dave Majeski admits he finds it hard to say no to good causes. It was a major gain for Edmonton when he arrived in 2004 as RBC's Vice President, Real Estate & Construction Services, continuing a 46-year career with the bank that had posted him in Toronto, Montreal, and Calgary along the way.

Dave had been active in the various communities in which he worked, but never on the scale of his volunteer work in Edmonton. It all started with the Canadian Finals Rodeo.

"I had arrived here after 10 years with RBC in Calgary and didn't know anybody in Edmonton. Then I saw a news story about Calgary wanting the Canadian Finals Rodeo. I decided to get involved to make sure the CFR didn't leave for Calgary. I was a fan of the sport of rodeo, but I was mainly interested in terms of its economic impact on Edmonton, and I was determined they weren't going to take it away from us."

It wasn't long before he was engaged as a volunteer, event organizer, board member, chair, or director with a host of community organizations: the Edmonton Police Foundation, Edmonton Film Fund, Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation, Edmonton Northlands, MacEwan University, United Way, and Miss Rodeo Canada — just to name a few. For the past several years, he has chaired the Gold Medal Plates dinner, an annual sell-out that raises thousands of dollars for Olympic athletes. Dave credits his wife Laura for her supportiveness, who is ever-understanding when Dave hears the call to join yet another volunteer endeavour.

"People here are very gracious and supportive of community and they want to find ways for themselves and others to get involved. What drives me is seeing an opportunity and knowing we can move the needle to make some progress and make an organization more relevant. I want to be engaged and to help them succeed."

Sandra B. Woitas, B.Ed, M.Ed, LLD (Hon)

Community Builder



Sandra Woitas' extensive professional and volunteer work has been dedicated to ensuring that all children and youth receive the best society has to offer. As principal of Norwood School, she engaged businesses and agencies to help feed, clothe and support her inner city students, beginning a network known as *Partners for Kids*. The City Centre Education Project (CCEP), with Sandra as Director, worked with seven inner city schools to ensure students had access to the necessary resources to realize their full potential, both academically and in life. The CCEP was

recognized by *Today's Parent* magazine as one of the Top Forty Schools in Canada. It was also honoured by the Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development for its collaborative practices.

From 2004 to 2009, Sandra was seconded to Alberta Education/Children and Youth Services as part of the Family Violence and Anti-Bullying Initiative. She worked with Alberta's parents, communities and schools providing the supports required to reduce bullying. Collaborating with the Alberta Mental Health Board, she assisted 18 school jurisdictions in piloting integrated mental health services for children and youth. In 2009, she returned to Edmonton Public Schools as Executive Director of the Edmonton Public Schools Foundation, raising funds and resources to enhance teaching in early learning and establishing full-day kindergarten classrooms for under-privileged children.

Sandra has been a member of the University of Alberta Senate and currently is an adjunct professor at the University of Alberta's Faculty of Education. She also sits on the Capital Zone Health Advisory Council. She was named one of the 100 Edmontonians of the Century in 2004. In addition to numerous other honours, in 2014 she received the Lions Club International Foundation Citizen of Distinction Award for Dedicated Humanitarian Services and an Honourary Doctor of Laws Degree from the University of Alberta.

"I grew up in a family that volunteered, and I just thought volunteer service is the price we pay for our space on earth. My mantra is simply 'be helpful in the best way you can'. I am a woman of average intelligence who wears sensible shoes. I have a great work ethic and the common sense to surround myself with good, smart people."

Sports Hall of Fame

Beginning in 1951, the Parks and Recreation Board, the Community Leagues, and the Edmonton Sportsman's Fund Inc. hosted an annual Ring Dinner where outstanding athletes were recognized for their achievements. The Ring Dinner later became the Civic Honour Awards, and then Salute to Excellence in the 1990s.

Edmonton's Sports Hall of Fame was created in 1959 and recognizes Edmonton athletes who represent the city with exemplary sportsmanship, skill and dedication. Our builders of sport have given our city a strong foundation on which our athletes develop their skills and abilities. Tonight, we honour these Edmontonians who worked tirelessly to achieve excellence in sports.



Howie Draper, BPE, MA

Sports Builder



He had to think twice before accepting the challenge — but now Howie Draper, Head Coach of the University of Alberta Pandas, is known for building and maintaining the most successful women's hockey team in Canada. Howie had played five seasons with the University of Alberta Golden Bears as he was earning his physical education degree. He got his start coaching in 1990 with the Midget AAA Maple Leaf Athletic Club and also coached in Australia. In 1997, he was asked to head up the new University of Alberta Pandas.

“When Ian Reade asked me to coach them, it was a shock. I pondered it a few days and thought it was a great opportunity to do something I love – work with people – and to do something from the bottom up. The opportunity to develop a program with the potential to be as rewarding for young people as the one I experienced was too good to turn down so I said ‘Let’s go for it!’”

The Pandas won their first national championship in 2000, just three years after the program was created. Howie has coached the team to seven Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) national championships — more wins than by any other University of Alberta coach in any sport and more than any other women's hockey team in the history of CIS. Howie has also scored two CIS silver medals, 12 Canada West titles and three CIS Coach of the Year awards. The Pandas didn't lose a regular season game between 2000 and 2005, racking up 86 consecutive wins.

Howie is also a tireless volunteer, and has acted as guest instructor, evaluator, and Head Coach of Team Alberta's U18 program. He was Head Coach of the Canadian Team that won gold at the 2013 Universiade in Trentino, Italy, and coached Team Alberta to gold and bronze on two separate trips to the Canada Winter Games.

“I came out of the Golden Bears Hockey environment where sharing in both the wins and failures was always emphasized. It's a very collaborative model. I'm fortunate enough to have benefitted from great players and assistant coaches who possessed strengths I didn't have. As a group we were able to do some amazing things.”

Dianne Greenough

Sports Builder



When Dianne Greenough began teaching at Victoria School in the late 1970s, she expected to be coaching her favourite sports, volleyball and basketball. Instead, noting a need to engage the girls at what was then a rather rough-edged school, she started a dance program. While at a dance competition in Los Angeles, the girls were taken with acrobatic cheerleading. Dianne launched a cheer program at Vic in 1980.

Over the next three decades, Dianne led Vic's cheer teams to win 26 city and 26 provincial titles — and more than 200 championship trophies from Australia, Mexico, Japan, the US and Canada. In 1983, Dianne was instrumental in having cheerleading recognized as a sport by the Alberta Schools' Athletic Association, which inducted her into its Sports Hall of Fame in 2013.

Dianne is now in her 20th season as head coach of the Edmonton Eskimos Cheer Team, widely considered the best cheer team in the CFL. In 1997, she launched the popular *Cheer Extravaganza*, an annual Grey Cup event that showcases all the CFL cheer teams. Dianne has produced and choreographed a variety of opening and closing ceremonies, including the 2005 World Masters Games, the 2001 World Track & Field Championships, the Canadian Finals Rodeo, the Queen's visit for Alberta's Centennial, and the 1997 and 2002 Grey Cups.

In 2010, Dianne, along with husband Jim and Leanne Livingston, opened *Perfect Storm Athletics*. With more than 800 members of all ages and abilities, Perfect Storm is one of the largest All-Star cheerleading gyms in North America. Members take cheer, dance, gymnastics and fitness classes, and may join competitive or recreational cheer teams. In the first two years, Dianne's teams have placed fourth or fifth in the world!

"For me, cheerleading has always been a vehicle to teach youth life skills and take them on a journey that can change their lives. It has been an amazing opportunity to teach trust, commitment, responsibility, integrity, leadership, teamwork and so much more. Seeing these young people become successful adults in the community, and knowing the confidence they develop from this sport, is a source of great pride."

Billy Moores

Sports Builder



When he was 16, Billy Moores arrived in Edmonton from British Columbia to play in the Oil Kings organization and has been at home in Edmonton and in hockey ever since.

Billy's career as player and coach spans four decades from minor through international ranks, leading to his position as Director, Coaching Development and Special Projects, with the Edmonton Oilers. He worked with the coaching staffs of the Oilers; its American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate, the Oklahoma City Barons; the ECHL's Bakersfield Condors; and the World Hockey League's (WHL) Edmonton Oil Kings.

At the University of Alberta, Billy played for the Golden Bears and returned as an assistant coach under Clare Drake, becoming Head Coach upon Drake's retirement. He led the Bears to five Canadian Interuniversity Athletics Union (CIAU) national championship tournaments and to two University Cup victories. The team won five Canada West Conference titles and never finished lower than second.

Billy was named Canada West Hockey Coach of the Year four times and CIAU Coach of the Year twice. Billy spent a year as Coach-General Manager of the Regina Pats, coached for two years in Japan, and was Assistant Coach for the National Hockey League's (NHL) New York Rangers before joining the Oilers as Assistant Coach in 2000. In 2009, Billy became the Senior Director of Player Development for the Oilers and in 2013 was appointed Director of Coaching Development and Special Projects. He also served as an assistant coach for Canadian national teams in several international tournaments.

Beyond Billy's accomplishments as a hockey coach, some say an even greater accomplishment was the impact he had as a junior high school teacher for 16 years, during which time he played a prominent role in the development of the innovative Donnan and Vimy Ridge sport schools. These schools combine athletics and education with a focus on the development of the whole person. Many of the young people who were taught by or played for Billy have moved into leadership roles in the Edmonton community.

"I always felt that my job as a teacher or coach was to establish and build on core values, and help young people reach their potential. For me, it was not just about winning or losing, it was about the process and helping them strive to do their best. I always felt privileged to work with young people."

In 2002, the daughters of four parent/ringette coaches in St. Albert were heading for the University of Alberta and presumably the end of their ringette careers.

"There weren't too many opportunities for girls to play back then. We thought, 'OK we need a place for them to

play. We should start a university team.' Once they graduated, we just continued on."

Today, more than two dozen university teams participate in the Canadian University and College Ringette League (CURL) as a result of what the 'Ringette 4' – Robert Bailey, Paul Hotke, Bonnie Peters and John Romyn – started.

Not only did they co-found CURL, but the four coaches are also more heavily involved than ever in developing university ringette in Edmonton and across Canada. The University Ringette team won its fourth consecutive Canadian National University Ringette Championship in January 2015.

Equally significant is the team's off-ice activity. Its motto is 'Excellence in academics, athletics and community service.' The coaches expect academic achievement by everyone on the team. To minimize the need for team members to work while studying, they established a scholarship program which is now worth more than \$50,000 annually.

The coaches have also instilled the concept of giving back to the community. Each year, the team's 18 members plan, organize and run a three-day event, *Ringette Scores on Cancer*, to raise money for cancer research at the Cross Cancer Institute. The event, which involves approximately 400 ringette players ages 8 to 16, has raised more than half a million dollars for cancer research over six years.

In 2012, the University Ringette team received the National Philanthropy award for its efforts. The team also runs a school visitation program and hosts summer ringette camps and clinics to help develop the skills of younger ringette players.

"Each year brings new things and the team is a little bit different. Really, it's the girls that motivate us to keep going."
