#### BACKGROUND:

 According to the 2011 Federal Census, Edmonton was identified as one of Canada's fastest growing cities. The growth in the city's population is one that is diverse. Shifts in immigration patterns from European countries toward Asian, South East Asian, Latin American and more recently African countries are changing the face of Edmonton. In Edmonton, 165,145 people (14.5 per cent of the population) speak a language other than English, French or one of the many Indigenous languages. Tagalog, Punjabi and Chinese are most common.

In 2007 City Council declared its membership in the Coalition of Municipalities
against Racism and Discrimination (CMARD) and in 2009 Council helped launch
the Racism Free Edmonton (RFE) initiative. A coalition of 16 institutional and
community partners, their collective efforts is to bring awareness, educate and
take action to confront racism and discrimination in Edmonton.

#### **DESIRED OUTCOMES:**

Creating a socially inclusive Edmonton, where newcomers and other citizens are
able to be involved in all aspects of the economic, social, political, and cultural
dimensions of civic life. By being engaged and interconnected with many diverse
peoples the development of a community of shared values, shared challenges
and equal opportunities in Edmonton, based on a sense of trust, hope and
reciprocity will create a socially cohesive city. Three focus areas will be targeted
to bring together various communities; Multicultural Centres, Local Immigration
Councils, and Social Inclusion Initiatives.

Focus #1 – Spaces for gathering, programming, and activities

 Support communities in accessing and developing new or using existing spaces.

Focus #2 – Development of a Local Immigration Partnership Council

- Bringing together a broad sector of agencies, institutions, businesses and communities to create a community plan and setting priorities to assist with welcoming and settling newcomers in Edmonton.

Focus #3 – Social Inclusion Initiatives

 In collaboration with allies, supporters and a broad number of communities, this third focus would bring together groups that experience discrimination, marginalization, and other various forms of prejudice towards the creation of a common platform for shared advocacy, education and collective action.
 Also, where necessary and when identified by the communities, mediation, reconciliation and restorative justice initiatives would be supported.
