



NEIGHBOURHOOD DESCRIPTION

The Miller neighbourhood is located within the Casselman-Heights District Outline Plan area. Manning Drive runs the length of the neighbourhood's eastern boundary and 50th Street runs the length of its western boundary, providing residents with access to other parts of the city. The nearby Clareview Light Rail Transit (LRT) station also provides good transit access.

Prior to urban development Miller was used for agriculture, but only a small portion of the area was actively cultivated. Two pipeline rights-of way cross the neighbourhood in the north, and their surfaces have been integrated with the pedestrian transportation network of the community. The school and park site located in the west-central area of the neighbourhood provides a large open space for residents. Additionally, a naturalized wetland park provides natural amenity space and a community focal point.

The neighbourhood began developing in the late 1990s and experienced the majority of its development during the early 2000s. Dwelling units within the neighbourhood consist of single-detached, semi-detached, linked row housing, stacked row housing, and low rise apartments. Non-residential land uses are clustered in the southern portion of the neighbourhood.

This neighbourhood was named after Abe William Miller (1897-1964), a Hungarian-born lawyer, politician and community volunteer. After immigrating to Canada in 1899 with his parents, Miller moved to Edmonton in 1914 and Graduated from the University of Alberta in 1925. Miller practiced law for forty years, served as a member of City Council for six years, and served as a member of the Alberta Legislature for four.

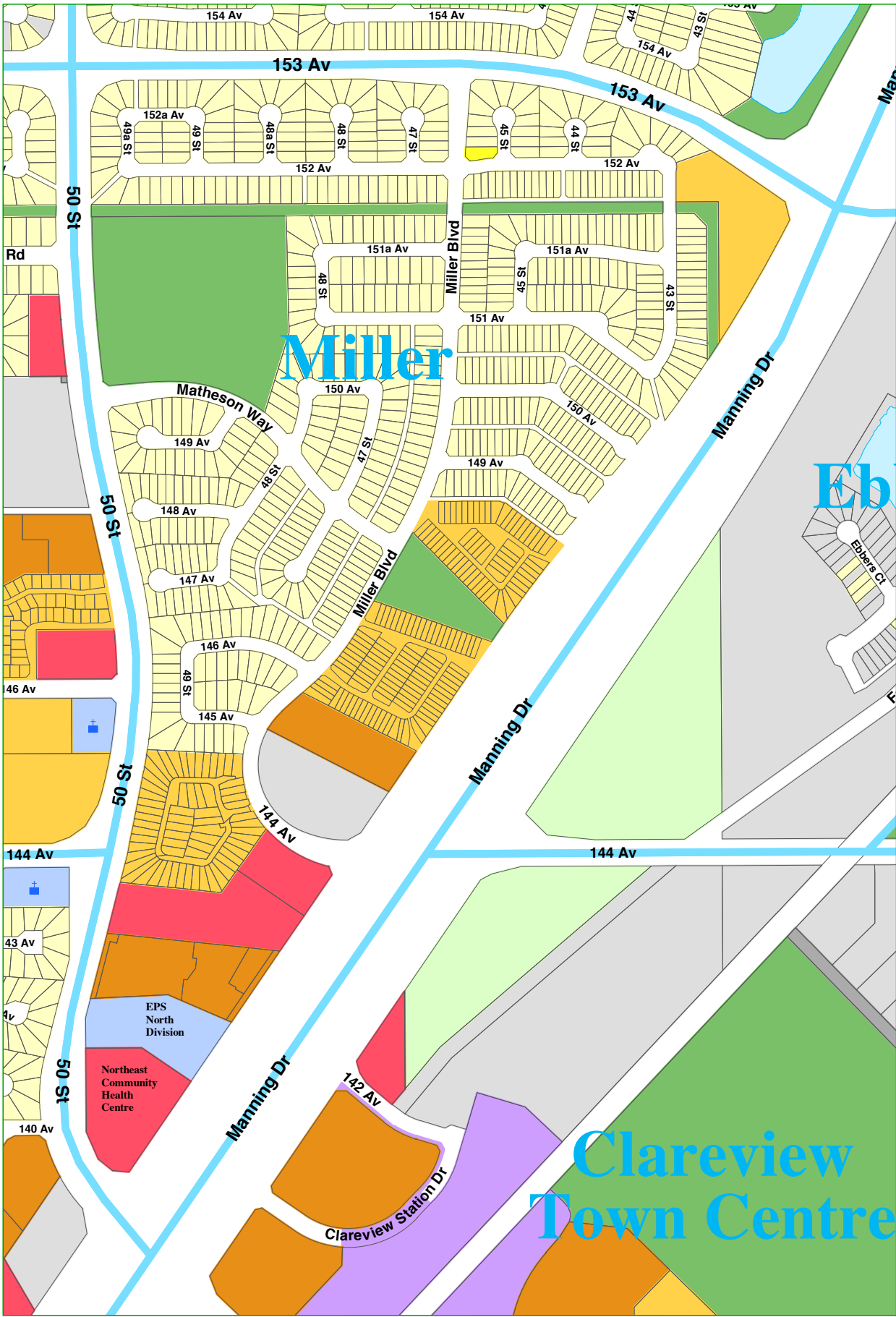
