Brief Description: This guide has a focus on evaluating community engagement and public participant, but much of the content has more general application to human services programs. The guide covers: understanding evaluation terminology, and purposes and types of evaluation; developing evaluation questions; understanding evaluation stages and scope; deciding on internal or external evaluation, and advantages and disadvantages of each; developing methods, and pros and cons of each method; addressing ethical considerations; using evaluation findings to drive program improvement; creating logic models and evaluation plans/frameworks; standards of community engagement; examples of 'generic' evaluation tools as well as tools specific to community engagement/participation. This guide does not cover all evaluation steps in depth, but is a good brief primer on key considerations.

Brief Description: Though this manual has a focus on evaluating tobacco control programs, much of the information is general enough to be relevant and .adaptable to other types of

human service programs, as well as being comprehensive regarding the steps of carrying out an evaluation. Topics include: doing needs assessment; planning a program; understanding program context; creating logic models; focusing an evaluation (process, outcome); designing an evaluation; identifying evaluation context and users; determining outcomes to measure; developing indicators, data sources and quantitative and qualitative methods; analyzing data and interpreting findings; making recommendations; and communicating and using the results.

Title: Measuring the Difference: An Outcome Evaluation Resource for the Disability Sector

Brief Description: This resource focuses on disability services, but much of the content is general enough to be relevant to other human services evaluation. The resource is presented as a series of modules that address: understanding outcome measurement and evaluation, as well as other evaluation approaches (beyond outcomes alone); creating logic models and related program theory (this guide goes into more detail on logic models than most other resources); building an outcome measurement framework (including methods, analysis, and connections to an agency's broader strategic framework); and creating an outcomes-focused organization (organizational culture). The resource also contains a glossary, a list of on-line resources plus an annotated bibliography, and information specific to the role of outcome measurement and evaluation in agency accreditation.

Topics are both indexed and searchable. Posts are typically about how an evaluator address a specific issue or challenge, or tried out a new or modified approach in a project.

Title: Better Evaluation

Year: 2011 — with ongoing updates (archived items available)

Brief Description: This site is designed to improve evaluation practice and theory by sharing information about options (methods or tools) and approaches. It is organized by a framework containing 7 clusters of evaluation tasks: managing an evaluation (or evaluation system); defining what is to be evaluated; framing the boundaries for evaluation; describing activities, outcomes, impacts and context; understanding causes of outcomes and impacts; synthesizing

data from one or more evaluations; and reporting and supporting use of findings. The site also includes brief resources on evaluation approaches (such as developmental and participatory evaluation, and many others); themes (such as sector-specific evaluation, capacity development, organizational performance, network evaluation), frequently asked questions (FAQs), a weekly blog, twitter feed, and interactive forums for asking questions of evaluation experts and/or peers).

Title: Program Development and Evaluation

Brief Description: This site contains many written resources – from brief overviews to detailed manuals - on topics such as: planning an evaluation; evaluation planning, creating a logic model that connects planning and evaluation (including an extensive on-line self-paced module, that can also be downloaded as a pdf); developing indicators (this is in the logic model module); gathering qualitative and quantitative data (methods), analyzing data and interpreting findings; presenting findings; examples of reporting evaluation highlights; and building evaluation capacity in organizations. The site also includes resources more specific to program planning and development -- including situation analysis, priority setting – and brief resources on adult learning and leadership self-assessment in an organizational context.

Brief Description: This blog-based resource consists of a series of 1 to 4 minute video tutorials of tips, tricks, and techniques for beginner-level and intermediate-level Excel users. Topic include getting data into Excel, organizing a spreadsheet, cleaning and recoding data, looking for patterns, calculating key statistics (such as averages, ranges, frequencies), and presenting findings in graphs and charts (such as pivot tables).

Partnership Evaluation

Title: Evaluation Guide: Fundamentals of Evaluating Partnerships

Organization: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

Authors: CDC staff and staff of several state health departments

Brief Description: In this guide, common evaluation steps are applied very specifically to partnership evaluation. Concepts from partnership/coalition theory are evident throughout, even if not explicitly stated. Topics include: identifying evaluation users (up front); engaging stakeholders; describing the partnership (both through creating a logic model and identifying partnership stage of development); focusing the evaluation by determining and prioritizing questions, and deciding on the evaluation design; gathering credible evidence through defining indicators, data sources, and a mix of quantitative and qualitative methods; justifying conclusions by analyzing data and interpreting results; using the results and sharing lessons learned. This guide includes extensive examples of questions, methods and tools pertaining to measuring partnership effectiveness (including group self-assessments, social network analysis).

Project Ethics

Title: A pRoject Ethics Community Consensus Initiative: Level 1 Project Ethics Course Level 1

Organization: Alberta Innovates – Health Solutions

Year: 2009 with ongoing updates (ARECCI itself began in 2003)

Brief Description: Self-guided ARECCI on-line module covers is focused on program evaluation and quality improvement projects. It covers understanding project ethics terminology and the ARECCI approach to project ethics considerations; understanding broad ethical principles (such as respect for human dignity, free and informed consent, vulnerable persons); ethical challenges and complexities; asking questions about six ethics considerations (such as: how will knowledge gained from the project be useful? how will you ensure that participant or is data selection process is fair and appropriate? what have you done to minimize risks and maximize benefits); applying the four project ethics principles (screening all projects, sorting by primary purpose – research vs evaluation/QI, determining risk category, reviewing according to risk category – more risk needs greater scrutiny); using the ARECCI risk screening and guidelines tools. The module includes ethics scenarios and knowledge self-assessments. The on-line module can be used toward the full Level 1 course if in-person component is also taken.
