# Arts & Culture Hall of Fame

Edmonton's Arts & Culture Hall of Fame was established in 1986 to honour outstanding individuals and groups whose body of work in arts and culture has brought recognition to the City of Edmonton. Its inductees include many exceptionally talented and dedicated Edmontonians. These outstanding individuals and groups, through their artistic or multicultural achievements, have brought honour and distinction to the City of Edmonton and have made exemplary contributions to its quality of life.

Tonight, we pay homage to those Edmontonians who worked tirelessly to build Edmonton's vibrant arts and culture community.



#### **Catherine Burgess RCA**

Artist



As an accomplished sculptor, Catherine Burgess is recognized as a leading artist on the national stage, and her passion for the local community over the past 35 years has earned her a special place as a beloved Edmontonian.

"She is not one to advertise herself. I believe that she understands the profound effect she has upon those around her and upon the local culture. The quality in her nature, the

exceptional importance of her work, and her strength of character have made her an artist that people speak of with reverence and admiration," said Bernd Hildebrandt, artist and sessional instructor at the University of Alberta.

Citing herself as a scavenger on a quiet quest for bits and pieces to create works she deems "experimental on a subconscious level," Burgess has set an enviable benchmark in the arts community. She was inducted into the prestigious Royal Canadian Academy of Arts (RCA) in 2002.

Over the years, downtown Edmonton has been graced with her acclaimed public art, including the works *The Big Rock*, a collaboration with sculptor Sandra Bromley in 1995, and *Return*, commissioned by the Edmonton Community Foundation in 2001.

Since graduating from the University of Alberta in 1975, Burgess has had more than 25 solo exhibitions. She has participated in over 60 group exhibitions in Canada, the United States, and Great Britain. Her work is displayed in 24 public collections across Canada.

Catherine Burgess' devotion and commitment to help mould Edmonton into a rich cultural centre has vaulted her to the highest level of public esteem. She has generously served on several public committees, art juries, the Board of Directors at the Edmonton Art Gallery, the Alberta Foundation for the Arts, and the Canada Council for the Arts.

Burgess has been a dedicated teacher in Design and Fine Arts at the University of Alberta, always encouraging her students to reach their full potential. She continues to be an inspirational mentor for young artists in Edmonton.

A tireless volunteer, Catherine Burgess currently serves on the Edmonton Public Art Committee and the Governing Council of the RCA.

#### **Gene Dub**

#### Artist/Builder



An architect and visionary, Gene Dub imagines Edmonton's future landscape transformed by the vast potential of its past. He firmly believes that the inner city's derelict and decayed monuments of yesteryear can be renewed to become urban gems.

As one prominent businessman put it, "He has brought life into buildings where there has been no life for some time.

No other architect in Edmonton has invested more of his time and personal resources into the redevelopment of our downtown."

Gene Dub has created award-winning masterpieces in the city for years. The design of Edmonton's iconic pyramided glass-and-stone City Hall in 1992 and Dub's current revival of the historic Alberta Hotel on Jasper Avenue illustrate the depth of his passion for reclaiming local heritage for generations to come. Prime Minister Sir Wilfrid Laurier stayed at the hotel when Alberta was proclaimed a province in 1905. The Alberta Hotel is also where Gene delivered newspapers as a youngster. The once stately building, torn down in 1984 to make way for Canada Place, will soon be a restored four-storey landmark near its original location in the heart of downtown.

Always "inventive, curious and bold," Gene Dub's architectural and artistic legacy also includes the restoration of the historic McLeod Building into an eye-catching residential and retail complex. In 2006, he developed the acclaimed Seventh Street Lofts, one of five initiatives helping to revitalize the warehouse district. Four years ago Gene purchased and redeveloped the former City Market on 97 Street, transforming it into an award-winning design for affordable housing.

Beyond architecture, Dub's record also proves a lifelong commitment to serve his community. He was a city councillor from 1977 to 1980 and has generously served on numerous civic boards and committees.

Edmonton's *Celebrate 2004* committee named Gene Dub one of the 100 Great Edmontonians of the past century. Gene Dub's work and vision continue to secure Edmonton's past for our future.

#### Jan Selman

#### Artist/Builder



Jan Selman has made her mark in collaborative popular theatre by always thinking outside the box. Her cutting edge artistic process for social change has been influential in making the genre more attractive across Canada.

Through her work and commitment, Jan's style of popular theatre has given voice to those less fortunate, including marginalized community groups, prison inmates, sexual

assault victims, and First Nations citizens.

Jan Selman "can stand firm on principle longer than anyone and she never gives up, not on people," said local playwright, Jane Heather, an assistant professor at the University of Alberta. "She reminds us of the possibilities, diversity, pleasure and hope we have in our community, in the arts and in ourselves."

For more than 35 years, Jan has been a groundbreaking leader in theatre that pushed past traditional boundaries throughout Canada and beyond.

Her ongoing mission to work outside the norm began with her tenure as the first artistic director of Edmonton's renowned Catalyst Theatre. There she developed acclaimed participatory techniques, styles that invite active audience participation to generate individual, community, and social change.

"It is no exaggeration to say that Catalyst Theatre under Jan's direction became the pre-eminent social action theatre in the country," said one prominent arts community member. "It was hugely influential in shaping popular theatre practice in companies across Canada."

For the past 20 years, Selman has moved over to the academic side of theatre. She just completed 10 years as Chair in the Department of Drama at the University of Alberta, and was recently awarded the U of A Excellence in Leadership Award.

Never one to say "good enough," Jan is currently utilizing her earned international influence in Kenya to help establish a new university.

Jan Selman is known throughout the Edmonton arts community as an "innovator, original thinker, and pioneer" whose work is continually asking, "How can we help make a better world?" For Jan Selman it is a sacred mission that never ends.

#### Dr. E.D. Blodgett

Artist



For more than four decades, famed poet Dr. Edward (Ted) Dickinson Blodgett has not only inspired Canada's literary community, but has made it his mission to touch the soul of Edmonton by defining its past, present, and future.

"Poetry recovers the life that most cities tend to remove, whether in the name of urban renewal or new marketing schemes or simply to be trendy. Poetry recovers life and

makes it speak of what we were, how we are, what we might want to be," Dr. Blodgett once wrote.

While Dr. Blodgett's insight has earned widespread respect and admiration, he is also known for his remarkable sincerity, humour, and artistic humility. He created some of his greatest poems while seated in the choir stall of Holy Trinity Anglican Church during Sunday services. This link with community has made him a revered figure.

"If it is true that youth is the capacity to be amazed, he is one who has found the fountain of youth as attested by his consuming curiosity," said Marc Arnal, Dean of Campus Saint-Jean at the University of Alberta.

This never ending reservoir of youthful energy, even at the age of 76, keeps Ted Blodgett on the cutting edge of his art. A two-time winner of the Governor General's Award for both poetry and translation, he is renowned for his work in both English and French. He has had 22 books of poetry published, with another three to come.

Blodgett was Edmonton's Poet Laureate from 2007 to 2009, a period when he produced memorable poems for the Louise McKinney Park public art project. He also served as chair of the Board of the Edmonton Arts Council, and was professor at the University of Alberta's North Campus and the Campus Saint-Jean for 34 years.

He remains passionate about serving Edmonton, as an artist and a volunteer playing his beloved lute at the University hospital.

As one prominent local academic noted, "Dr. Blodgett is an inspiring person who has served Edmonton with extraordinary dedication. He has made this a better place to live."

## Award of Distinction

Every few years an individual or organization appears to have initiated a course of events so unique that it demands recognition from the City of Edmonton Salute to Excellence Committee. In such circumstances, the Selection Committee may decide to honour said individual or organization with the presentation of the Salute to Excellence Award of Distinction. Such an outstanding group has been selected this year.



Chorale Saint-Jean



#### **Chorale Saint-Jean**

(Conductor Professor Laurier Fagnan)

For almost 75 years, Edmonton's Chorale Saint-Jean has been the inspirational musical voice of the Francophone community in western Canada. More recently, under the direction of internationally renowned conductor Dr. Laurier Fagnan, associate professor of music at Campus Saint-Jean at the University of Alberta, the 70-member choir has spread the rich cultural vitality of Alberta's 68,000 strong Francophone community around the world.

"Chorale St. Jean has demonstrated a commitment not only to being a positive force for the maintenance and development of Francophone life, but also a level of excellence that places them amongst the finest Francophone choirs anywhere in the world," said Leonard Ratzlaff, the university's professor of choral music.

But the choir's first priority is to serve Edmonton and the province's Francophone community. It participated in the centennial celebrations of Edmonton in 2004, Alberta the following year, and of Campus Saint-Jean and the University of Alberta in 2008. As well, the choir has performed at many local benefit concerts, including collaborations with members of the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra and Royal Canadian Artillery Band.

This local success has prompted enthusiastic invitations from beyond Alberta. In 2005, the choir toured Quebec, singing to almost 10,000 Quebecois, including an audience of 1,500 at the Basilique Notre-Dame de Montreal.

Three years later the choir performed a spotlight concert at Quebec City's 400th anniversary celebrations. The choir also joined a 72-group ensemble from all corners of the Francophone globe for a performance that featured 1,400 singers. Dr. Fagnan was one of the six invited conductors.

There is more acclaim to come as Chorale Saint-Jean gears up for a tour of France this summer where the choir will collaborate with Les Petits chanteurs de Saint-Marc from the celebrated film Les Choristes.

Next year the choir will partner with the Quebec Choral Federation to host Choralies 2012 that will attract over 1,000 choristers to Edmonton from across the French-speaking world.

The beautiful voice of Chorale Saint-Jean, which has thrilled Edmontonians and Albertans since 1937, has clearly positioned itself for a harmonious future in song.

# Community Service Hall of Fame

The Community Service Hall of Fame was established in 2004 to bonour outstanding individuals or organizations who have made significant or lifetime contributions to the community.

The Community Service Hall of Fame inductees have raised awareness, created new institutions where needed, and strengthened the character of the community they serve by providing us with role models and venues for our growth as responsible and compassionate citizens.



#### Dr. Robert C.P. Westbury

Builder



Whenever Edmonton needed impossible dreams realized, there was no better person for the task than Dr. Bob.

More formally known as Dr. Robert Westbury, this remarkable volunteer and community booster is famous for rallying doubters with quotes from the musical Man of La Mancha. It was his way of underscoring that fretting about perceived challenges was merely "tilting at windmills."

In 2003, sceptics said that Dr. Bob would not be able to raise \$7.5 million for the Fringe Theatre Adventures and TransAlta Arts Barns, a year-round multi-purpose community arts complex and home to the annual Edmonton International Fringe Festival. He proved them wrong by raising 9.2 million.

There were doubters in 2004 when he was asked to chair Edmonton's organizing committee for the Juno Awards. But Dr. Bob was once a music man who trudged his way through university by playing saxophone in a Glenn Miller cover band. He got the job done. The Junos were a smashing success and Edmonton broke all attendance records.

Dr. Bob comes from a broad, varied business and educational background. He was a teacher, principal and director with Edmonton Catholic Schools. He is a past Vice-President with TransAlta Corporation and past President of SEEDS Foundation, a Canadian organization funded by the energy industry to create textbooks for millions of Canadian students to present a balanced environment/energy view of sustainability.

At age 74, Dr. Bob remains active. Over the past decade, he has fundraised for numerous community and arts organizations. He has found time to chair the TELUS Edmonton Community Board, the Alberta Order of Excellence, the Alberta Centre for Child, Family and Community Research and the Enoch Paragon River Cree Resort board. Dr. Bob is currently TELUS' Chief Advisor, Capital Region, Relations and Innovation.

Dr. Bob was named one of Alberta's 50 Most Influential people by *Alberta Venture* in 2003 and 2004. Last December, he was inducted to the Order of Canada. Dr. Robert Westbury remains an inspirational force in Edmonton.

Like Don Quixote in Man of La Mancha, he is never afraid to challenge the impossible dream.

# Sports Hall of Fame

Beginning in 1951, the Parks and Recreation Board, the Community Leagues, and the Edmonton Sportsman's Fund Inc. hosted an annual Ring Dinner where outstanding athletes were recognized for their achievements. The Ring Dinner later became the Civic Honour Awards, and then Salute to Excellence in the 1990s.

The Edmonton Sports Hall of Fame was created in 1959.

Edmonton athletes have represented the city credibly in competition, with exemplary sportsmanship and skill.

Our builders of sport have given our city a strong foundation in which our athletes develop their skills and abilities.

Tonight, we bonour these Edmontonians who worked tirelessly to achieve excellence in sports.



#### Mrs. Ollie Olga Currie

Builder



Ollie Currie has dedicated 40 years to assisting competitive swimmers attain their personal goals at local, provincial, and national levels. Her volunteer "career" began as a swim parent in 1970 with the Jasper Place Swim Club. From that moment on, Ollie's infectious attitude became her defining mantra.

Ollie's commitment as a builder in the sport of swimming took her around the world as an ambassador for Edmonton and Canada. She was Team Manager with the Canadian National Team at the 1988 Seoul Olympics, three World Championships, four Commonwealth Games, five Pan Am Games, three Pan Pacific Championships, plus numerous other International competitions. In 1994, she was appointed Chef de Mission to the World Aquatic Championships in Rome.

For more than 15 years, Ollie has been involved with the Swimmers With A Disability national program, and was Canadian Team Manager at three Paralympics, World Championships, and other international meets.

Her continued dedication to swimmers at the community level have made her special to Edmonton. Ollie's 35 year leadership contributions have included chairing numerous national championships, Para Swimming Championships, World Cups, World Masters Games, and local competitions. She was also Competition Director for the 1983 Universiade Games. Ollie has served as Board Director of Swim Canada, Commonwealth Games, Canadian Paralympic Committee, and as President of Swim Alberta and the Edmonton Keyano Swim Club.

She continues to be a revered "surrogate mother" to countless athletes who have benefited from her efforts. "A brief stroll around a pool deck with Ollie at a swim meet will see several people approach with hugs and best wishes. She is truly an inspiration," said Dr. Cam McGinnis, President of the Edmonton Keyano Swim Club.

Currie's selfless commitment to youth and the sport of swimming has been recognized with Swim Canada awards, induction into the Alberta Sports Hall of Fame, and being named to the Order of Canada. Ollie Currie is first to recognize that her accolades have been due largely to the efforts of others. She displays "the spirit of a genuine builder."

#### Mr. Wally (Walter) A. Litousky

Builder



Almost half a century ago when Wally Litousky toured Italy as a member of the Royal Canadian Air Force, he was given the nickname "Maestro" for his mastery in judo, the art of self-defence.

Wally was a career military weapons technician but he carried with him an inspiring and compassionate aura that was already earning him a special place in the sport of judo,

which means "the gentle way" in Japanese. "Wally is not only a gentleman, he is kind. His welcoming smile and outstretched hand to greet you each and every time is a memory to be cherished," says a Judo Alberta spokesperson.

Litousky was a passionate participant and builder of his sport from the moment a Japanese teenager surprised him in 1953 at a high school wrestling workout. "He began pounding me from pillar to post with all these judo moves," said Wally. "After that whenever I got spare time, I asked him for pointers."

Wally is considered one of most influential masters to ever grace the sport in Edmonton and throughout Alberta. He has done it all – black belt champion, coach, referee and generous mentor to hundreds of young kids, many of them going on to compete at the national level.

Always the gentle Maestro, he thrilled students and organizers with his infectious attitude and was a constant supporter of the underdog.

Wally started and coached clubs everywhere he was stationed in the military, including Edmonton and Cold Lake, and was a co-founder of the Edmonton Yudanshakai Judo Society, an organization that provides local judo tournament opportunities. Since retiring from the military in 1980, Wally has volunteered to coach and referee at more than 250 tournaments and clinics across the province.

Edmonton honours Wally Litousky's half-century of selfless dedication to countless young athletes. Although the Maestro remains positively humble, many are convinced he is a hero. "Wally gave more of himself than most people realize," says long-time judo colleague and friend Kenneth Greer. "Wally has meant a lot to many kids." Edmonton's gentle Maestro continues to show us "the way."

#### **Scotty Olson**

**Athlete** 



As a kid Scotty Olson was considered too small for sports. Barely five feet tall and weighing no more than 112 pounds, he found himself jumping from one sport to another, fumbling at every one he tried.

Then in 1982 at the age of 14, Olson met boxer Al Ford, a former Canadian lightweight champion. Ford told this big hearted little kid to head to Edmonton's Cougar Boxing Club.

There local boxing legend Paul Hortie immediately saw Scotty's desire and told him that if he was prepared to work hard his dreams would come true.

With the tenacity of a bulldog, Scotty went to work to excel in a demanding sport. When his first lesson was over he told his newfound mentor, "I love this place. And I want to be the champion of the world." Bulldog became Scotty's nickname and his journey to greatness began.

In 1984, he won the provincial flyweight title. That same year Scotty won the Canadian championship, the first of six consecutive titles. In 1986, the Bulldog electrified Canadians by winning the gold medal at the Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh, Scotland. Two years later, Scotty represented Canada at the Olympic Games in Seoul, South Korea.

Olson entered his professional career in the United States in 1990, under the guidance of boxing promoter Bob Arum. The Bulldog won his first 19 bouts before claiming his first title – the United States Boxing Association flyweight championship. His greatest triumph was before Edmonton fans in 1994 when he won the International Boxing Association light flyweight title. The Bulldog was world champion – just as he had promised the late Paul Hortie.

Scotty defended his title five times before retiring in 2002, compiling a record of 34 wins (25 by knockout), four losses and two draws. He was inducted into the AlbertaSports Hall of Fame in 2009. Today, he can still be found at Edmonton boxing tournaments cheering on and inspiring rising stars.

Scotty Olson has proven that heart, determination, and perseverance make anything possible.

#### Murray F.R. Smith

#### Builder



Dr. Murray Smith is not only recognized as Edmonton's consummate sports builder, he is also known as a passionate community leader who always found time to wear many different hats. His vaunted reputation has spanned over six decades and every area of sports imaginable –athlete, coach, sports psychologist, educator, volunteer, and sports administrator.

"His goal has always been to serve, and his enlightened way of challenging while nurturing has uplifted the many lives he's touched," said one admiring local businessman. "The details of Dr. Smith's tremendous contribution to his community and Canadian sport in general could fill a book."

Beginning at age 23 in 1948, Dr. Smith was a high school and university coach in football, basketball and swimming for more than three decades. His championship teams include the Alberta Junior Football League Edmonton Huskies and the University of Alberta football and swimming squads.

In 1958, he began an illustrious three-decade academic career at the University of Alberta. While teaching healthy values to generations of students, he also served as psychologist for the University's Golden Bears hockey and basketball teams. For the past quarter century, Dr. Smith's expertise in sports psychology has been internationally recognized. Major sports organizations across the country have sought his services, including the NHL's Edmonton Oilers, the Memorial Cup champion Kelowna Rockets, and numerous national and Olympic athletes.

However, Dr. Smith's talent for sports management especially shone at home in Edmonton. He was the director of the Sports Division for Edmonton's Commonwealth Games in 1978. Five years later he was the Vice-President of Venues when the City hosted the World University Games. With so much already achieved, Dr. Smith still found room for another hat – volunteering for community and sports organizations, including the University of Alberta Sports Wall of Fame and the Alberta Cancer Board.

It's time to pause and raise our own hats to Dr. Murray Smith and his remarkable record and legacy as a builder in both sports and the community.

He was inducted into the Edmonton Cultural Hall of Fame in 2002, and received the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal.

#### Chorale Saint-Jean – Conductor Professor Laurier Fagnan

Edmonton's Chorale Saint-Jean, is a 70 member mixed French language community and university choir of Campus Saint-Jean of the University of Alberta. Chorale Saint-Jean prides itself in providing French-speaking singers the opportunity to sing both classical and more popular repertoire in a unique French environment. They present two concerts each year, a "Concert de Noel" at Christmas and a "Concert de Printemps" in the spring.

#### Kent Sangster – Salute to Excellence Orchestra

Juno nominee Kent Sangster has been a nationally recognized jazz recording artist for almost 20 years. Kent holds a Master of Music degree in Studio Jazz Writing from the University of Miami and a B.A. Jazz degree from St. Francis Xavier University. Kent is currently on faculty at Grant MacEwan University, as well as being the Executive Director and Producer of the Edmonton International Jazz Festival.

#### Wayne Feschuk - Piano

Wayne Feschuk is considered one of Canada's finest jazz pianists having performed with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, the Edmonton Jazz Orchestra, and for the Queen of England. He is also the recipient of an Edmonton Performing and Creative Arts Award for outstanding achievement in music and was featured on two Juno-nominated recordings.

#### **Obsessions Quartet - VIP Reception**

The Obsessions Quartet was founded in 2005 and features violinist Joanna Ciapka- Sangster, violinist Neda Yamach, violist Rhonda Henshaw, and cellist Ronda Metszies. This Juno nominated ensemble explores and performs a wide range of musical styles from baroque, to romantic to tango and even some jazz. All members of the quartet are also members of the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, as well as many other professional Edmonton-based ensembles.
