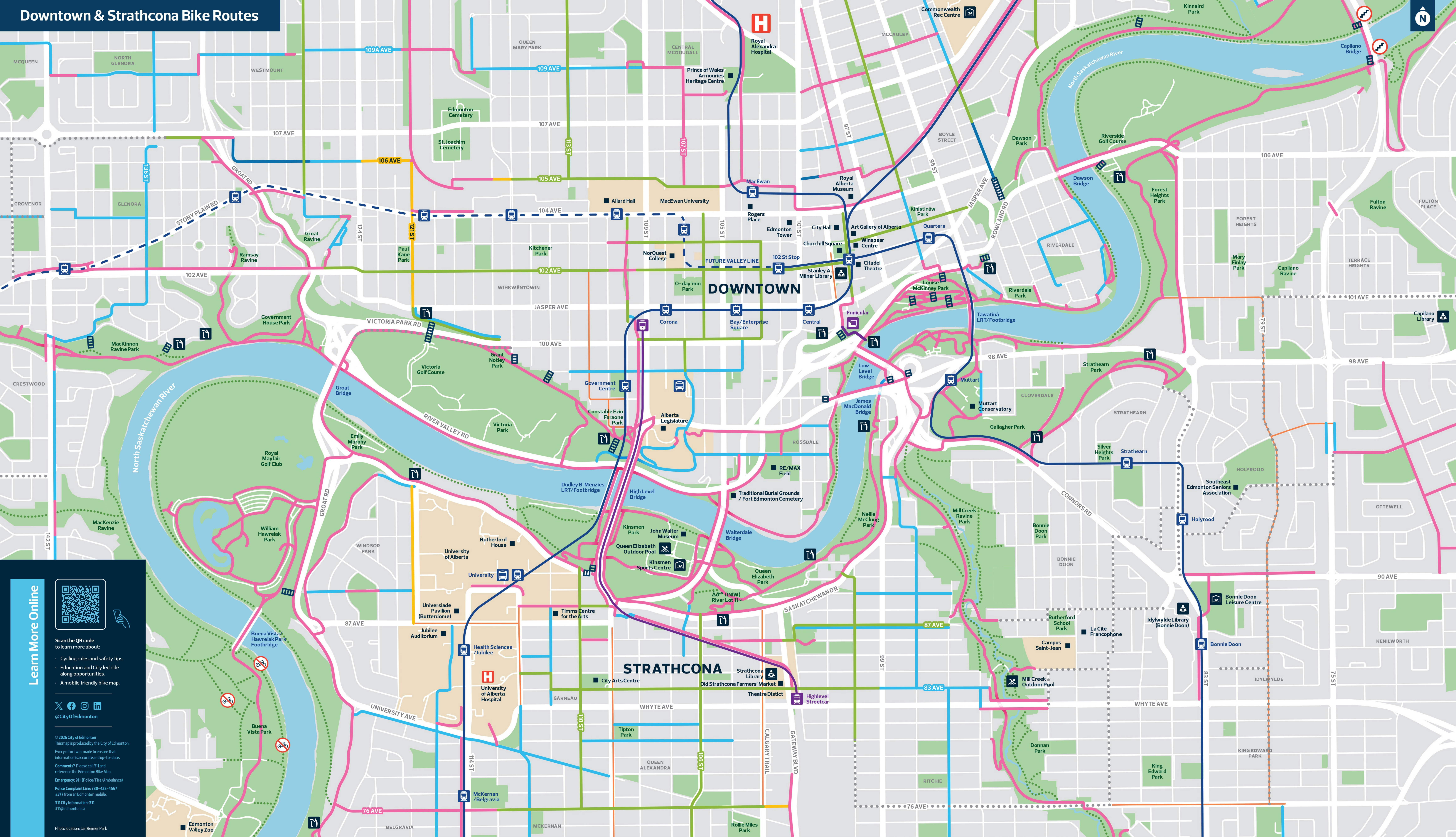

## KEY

- Protected Bike Lanes**  
On-street lanes separate from cars, for cycling and scootering. Sidewalk level or with barriers.
- Painted Bike Lanes**  
On-street lanes marked with paint and designated for people cycling and scootering.
- Route Coming Soon**  
New bike routes that are planned for construction.
- Shared Pathways**  
Paved, off-street paths for people walking, biking and rolling.
- Shared Roadways (Low Traffic)**  
People cycling and driving share the road on quiet streets. Marked with signs or symbols on the road.
- Local Street Bikeway**  
On-street lanes marked with traffic calming measures. Marked with signs or symbols on the road.
- Shared Roadways (High Traffic)**  
People cycling and driving share the road. Marked with signs or symbols on the road. For people comfortable riding in traffic.
- Trails**  
Paths that are packed with gravel, wood chips or dirt. Bike, walk, run and more; except where indicated by signs.
- LRT Station**
- Recreation Centre**
- Outdoor Pool**
- Library**
- Major Bus Stop**
- Hospital**
- No Bikes Allowed**
- Point of Interest**

### The Network

A combination of trails, paths and bike routes used by people cycling, walking, running and rolling.

The network includes:

- **District connector routes:** Extend through neighbourhoods to help people travel across the city.
- **Neighbourhood routes:** Connect destinations within a community.
- **River valley shared pathways:** Form a recreational network through parks and ravines.

### Required Equipment

- 1) Bike helmet\*
- 2) Red tail lamp
- 3) Red rear reflector
- 4) White headlamp
- 5) Bell or horn
- 6) Brakes

\*Helmets are required for those under the age of 18 and anyone who is operating a power bike or e-bike.

### How We Roll

People cycling have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicles as per the Alberta Traffic Safety Act. You may ride on all roads and Edmonton's active transportation network of shared pathways and bike lanes.

Riding a bicycle, e-scooter or e-bike is not permitted on sidewalks. This does not apply to children 16 years and younger.

### Wayfinding

Signs are being installed along on-street bike routes and shared pathways to help direct users to destinations.

### Using Bike Lanes

**Green Stripes** raise awareness and visibility of people cycling and help make movements more predictable.

**Green Bike Boxes** create space on the road for people cycling to wait in front of motor vehicles or turn without crossing multiple vehicle lanes.

**Bike Triggered Crossings** help people move through intersections safely. Watch for a blue light and a "Bike Detected" sign.

### Shared Pathways

When passing others on shared paths:

- Ring your bell.
- Pass on the left.
- Slow down and give space.

Watch for this sign  
Some sidewalks may be designated as shared pathways

### Riding on Roads

Tips to ride with confidence on the road:

- Ride far enough out from the curb to avoid obstacles and help drivers see you.
- Avoid weaving in and out of parked vehicles.
- Shoulder check and use hand signals when turning.
- Avoid riding where drivers can't see you in their mirrors.

### Be Safe, Leave Space

**Edmonton's Safe Passing Distance Bylaw:**

- On roads that are 60 km/h or lower, people driving must leave 1 metre of space from people cycling.
- On roads that are 70 km/h and above, people driving must leave 1.5 metres of space from people cycling.

### Intersections

Being aware and visible at intersections:

- Keep your eye on vehicles turning or entering and exiting parking lots and alleys.
- For increased visibility, move into the middle of the lane as you approach an intersection.

**Right of way:**

- When crossing a street on a shared path, yield to pedestrians and drivers. If cycling, you do not need to dismount your bicycle.

### Take Transit

Bikes and e-scooters are allowed on LRTs. Full-sized and articulated buses, with the exception of regional buses that travel on highways, have an easy-to-use bike rack that can carry up to two bikes.

### Micromobility

Shared electric scooters and bikes are a great way to explore and travel.

**Where to Ride:** You can ride on shared pathways, bike lanes and roads with a speed limit of 50 km/h or lower. They are not permitted on sidewalks or on park trails not maintained by the City.

**Where to Park:** Please ensure you do not block building doors, sidewalks or trails when parking.
