Application Process and Qualifications

I don't see the application on edmonton.ca/FireCadets. Where can I find it?

The website is updated with an application link each April. Application questions will be embedded into the website.

I will graduate from high school this current year. Can I still apply for the Fire Cadet program after high school?

The Fire Cadet program is designed to take advantage of work experience programs within the local school boards. If you are out of school, you unfortunately will no longer be eligible to participate in the programming. We encourage you to continue your firefighting journey with local programs that offer firefighting courses.

I am homeschooled. Am I eligible to apply?

There have been fire cadets from homeschooling programs in the past. Eligibility is determined on a case-by-case basis. The school board must still have a work experience program, with WCB coverage for students to be eligible. We encourage you to look into the work experience program with your school board before applying. All other applicant qualifications will still apply.

I don't live in Edmonton. Can I still apply?

Edmonton Fire Rescue Services will accept applications from anyone committed to physically attending class every Wednesday from 6:00 - 9:30 p.m. (punctuality is very important). We have had students from Spruce Grove, Sherwood Park, Fort Saskatchewan, Leduc, Wetaskiwin, and other neighbouring communities. As long as you and/or your parents are committed to driving the distance and being on time, your application is more than welcome.

Can I apply while in Grade 9?

You may apply while in your Grade 9 year, for entrance to the program during your Grade 10 year. Proof of completion at the end of Grade 9 may be asked for.

Do I need to provide a resume and cover letter if I answer all of the application questions?

Yes. This program is designed to introduce you to firefighting, but it is ultimately for you to challenge your boundaries and take one more step into adulthood. Learning to prepare a resume and cover letter is a lifelong skill that you will need, plus it gives you a chance to add anything that wasn't covered in the application questions.

What suggestions do you have for being a competitive applicant?

We advise receiving help when preparing your resume and cover letter, considering activities that employers often look for on a resume (volunteerism, certifications/awards, etc.), and answering all application questions

fully and completely. Remember: Your application, resume, and cover letter is the only chance to make a first impression.

How will I be contacted about the results of my application/interview?

The Fire Cadet program is a very popular program. We typically receive hundreds of applications for limited spots. All applicants will receive a notification of their status to the email they provided during the application process. Applicants who are selected to move on will be contacted directly to schedule interviews. This notification will occur near the middle of May.

What's the interview like? When will they be?

Interviews will be scheduled for approximately the last couple weeks of May, and possibly into the first week of June. It is a virtual, group interview. You will be in the interview with three or four other applicants. To remove barriers, we have scheduled interviews virtually so everyone has a chance to participate without having to travel to the Training Academy. For the interview, you will require a device that can log into Google Meet and a stable Wi-Fi connection. Students in the past have taken the interview virtually from their schools as well. Interviews will be scheduled after school times.

Please treat the interviews like an interview: Dress appropriately and take time to prepare.

Are there any other costs associated with this program?

Due to the generosity of ATCO and Edmonton Fire Rescue Services, all supplies and uniforms will be provided. However, participants will need to supply their own running or athletic shoes. Occasionally, fire cadets will have the opportunity to participate in station tours (HazMat, Fire Dispatch, STARS Air Ambulance, etc.), and as a token of appreciation, classes have typically chipped in and brought something for the hosting crew at a very minimal cost.

What are the physical requirements of the application process? Is there a physical test?

Physical ability is not tested for the Fire Cadet program. A <u>medical form</u> will need to be completed prior to the start of the program, and it is expected that you will start with a basic level of fitness with no restrictions. Being able to lift and carry 50 pounds, climb stairs, and walk/run five kilometers would give you a good base for what you will need to accomplish during the programming. The Fire Cadet program does not look at how many reps or laps you can do, but that you are willing to keep striving for one more.

Where are the training locations?

Edmonton Fire Rescue Services' Training Academy is located at <u>10420 - 157 Street NW, Edmonton</u>, and the Poundmaker Training Facility is located at <u>18645 - 106a Ave NW, Edmonton</u>.

My parents/guardians want to stay and watch on Cadet Night. Is that allowed?

Unfortunately, parents or guardians are not permitted to observe during Cadet Night. We do try to schedule a night later in the second semester for parents to attend and see all of the progress the class has made over the course of the year.
