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
Public Engagement Summary and Results

Project Overview & Timeline

The Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park Renewal aims to enhance the park's outdoor spaces. Building on work done in the Concept Plan and Master Plan, the design phase is the third step towards implementing the Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park Master Plan.

We are currently in the Design phase of the outdoor spaces portion of the project. The next phases for the outdoor spaces are not currently funded.

NOTE: The Rollie Miles Recreation Facility is a separate project to the Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park Renewal Project. The Design phase for the Recreation Facility will be undertaken separately, beginning in 2022.



How the Preferred Preliminary Design was Created

The project team created the preferred preliminary design based on the feedback from the first phase of engagement and from the direction outlined in the Master Plan, created in 2018.


The draft designs were developed to:

- + Align with City of Edmonton policies and programs
- + Consider the vision and design principles created during the Concept Plan and Master
- + Integrate community and stakeholder feedback input gathered through online stakeholder and public engagement
- + Reflect the technical requirements for the outdoor spaces
- + Incorporate current design and construction standards and practices


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What We Heard

Participants were asked if the preferred design for the 105A Street Open Spaces meets the needs of users and area residents.







Grandstand Area









104 Street

 + Bus loading area + South athletic field fence shifted north + Sidewalk from 104 Street to grandstand + Fence realigned to create a landscaped shared-use path corridor separate from vehicles on 104 Street + Tree and shrub planting for screening of field from 104 Street + Welcome nodes with signs + Low-impact design (LID) features for stormwater management 	 Desire for traffic calming measures added north of the bus stop and the loading area to be separated from the driving lane to not impact traffic flow Support for the separation of the pathway from traffic 104 street Desire for outdoor winter skating and suggestions to add cross country skiing track 	

Additional comments

- + Ensure there is access for the community to use facilities during school hours
- + Consider creating a distinct character in the park to attract community members from other areas of the city
- + Ensure wheelchair accessibility in park
- + Ensure amenities are available for all age groups
- + Concerns about parking throughout the area during school hours and events at the athletic field
- + Consider moving the outdoor basketball courts to the current Scona Pool location when the pool is removed

Public Engagement Approach


Decision Making Process

As part of the decision-making process, decisions are made based on three components:

Technical Requirements - what infrastructure best meets the area needs, where it can fit, and what impacts it will have to the immediate and surrounding areas

City Policies and Programs - how City initiatives and activities are implemented

Public Input - local knowledge and feedback from community stakeholders

How We Engaged

Communication

To promote the project and the engagement opportunities, the following communication methods were used:

20 temporary signs were placed throughout the area

Public and Stakeholder Engagement Activities

Feedback gathered in this phase of engagement focused on the draft designs for the Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park Renewal. Thank you to those who engaged with the project team virtually during this time.

Online Survey

An online survey was open from April 25 to May 9, 2022. A total of 109 participants completed the online survey.

Online Learning Session

An online learning session was hosted on April 26, 2022, to share project information and answer questions. A recording of the session was added to the project website for community members to watch if they were not able to join.

Stakeholder and Resident Meetings

An online stakeholder meeting was hosted on April 20, 2022, to gather feedback from Queen Alexandra Community League, Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues, and representatives from the Central Area Community Leagues.

An online meeting with select residents from 74 Avenue and 75 Avenue was hosted on April 13, 2022, to gather feedback about the changes to the shared-use path and access to 74 Avenue and 75 Avenue behind the grandstand area.

Who Was Engaged

- Residents who live close to the Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park
- Visitors/users of Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park
- + Friends/family of residents who live near or use Rollie Miles Athletic Field District
- + Other: Edmontonians, Strathcona High School parents, users or advocates for the Scona Pool

What We Asked

Online Survey

Participants were presented with draft design options. Participants were asked how each option meets the needs of users of Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park. Participants were also asked if the design options align with the Vision and Design Principles.

Online Learning Session

The project team shared the draft designs in a presentation and answered participants' questions.

Stakeholder Meeting

Stakeholders were asked to comment on the draft designs. Additionally, there was an opportunity for participants to ask questions and identify concerns they may have about the draft designs and the project.

What Happens Next?

Feedback gathered at this phase of engagement will be used to finalize the preliminary design. Further phases of the Rollie Miles Athletic Field District Park Renewal are not currently funded.
