IT ONLY TAKES MINUTES

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When temperatures are above 15°C, leave your pet at home when running errands.

If Louis is left in a hot car, he could suffer heat stroke, organ damage, or death. Even with the windows cracked and parked in the shade, the temperature inside of a car can get to deadly levels within minutes.

How to help a pet left in a hot car

- + Take down the car's make, model and licence plate number and exact location.
- + If the animal is in distress, call 911.
- If the owner can't be found nearby, call 311 and wait by the car for Animal Control Officers to arrive.

Heatstroke symptoms and signs of distress

- + Excessive, rapid panting
- + Diarrhea
- + Drooling
- + Weakness, tremors, convulsions, fainting
- + Vomiting
- + Confusion
- + Trouble walking, wobbly



Leaving an animal in a hot car and causing it to be in distress may result in fines or charges under the Animal Protection Act and/or the Criminal Code of Canada.

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
