Planning & Development Process

We are here



Strategic Plans, Policies and Guidelines

Strategic Plans provide high level objectives to guide development of the entire City (ex. Municipal Development Plan)

Policies and
Guidelines provide
further direction
on how to achieve
objectives (ex. Winter
City Guidelines)

Heritage Valley Servicing Concept Design Brief

High level outline of how a group of neighbourhoods will develop

Includes information on arterial roads, major servicing and the general location of land uses

Neighbourhood Area Structure Plans

More detailed design of a residential neighbourhood

Included information on staging, collector roadways, infrastructure and servicing, land uses and densities, parks and schools

Zoning, Subdivision and Servicing Agreements

Zoning establishes development rights including uses, building heights, landscaping and parking

Subdivision divides land into smaller parcels

Servicing Agreements identify municipal improvements to be built by the developer (sewers, water, roads, etc.)

Development and Building Permits

Allows for the construction and operation of new homes, buildings, parks and facilities based on the Edmonton Zoning Bylaw and the Alberta Building Code

Applicant Engagement Process

City Led Required Process











Roles & Responsibilities

Applicant/ **Developer**

(City and Government of Alberta)

- Creates and submits Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan application
- Considers City policy and public feedback as they work with the City through the Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan process and refine their application

City of **Edmonton**

- Accepts and reviews the Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan application from the applicant
- + Ensures public feedback is considered by the applicant
- Collects knowledge and feedback from City staff, stakeholders and the public to ensure a comprehensive analysis

Public

(Residents & Stakeholders)

- Provides knowledge and feedback to the City and applicant regarding the Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan application
- Makes final decision on the Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan application which considers public feedback and the City's planning analysis and

recommendation



When creating this neighbourhood plan, a variety of factors must be considered.










Site Context

Contextual Information

- The land is owned by the Government of Alberta, and was previously used for University of Alberta agriculture research
- + Subject area is 320 acres
- Will be served by the future Capital
 Line South LRT and associated station
- Will be home to a new hospital and health campus announced by the Government of Alberta in March 2017

Existing Policy Requirements

Higher Level Plans

Development in the Heritage Valley area is guided by the Servicing Concept Design Brief (SCDB), which outlines basic servicing and infrastructure requirements for the area.

Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan (NASP)


- A neighbourhood area structure plan (NASP) provides the next level of detail, based on the Servicing Concept Design Brief.
- It aims to provide a framework to guide future rezoning and subdivision.

What is included in a neighborhood plan?

- + Neighbourhood vision
- Development concept identifying land use: residential, commercial, parks, etc.
- Infrastructure and servicing
- Transportation networks (vehicles, transit, and active transportation)
- Staging Plan

 (development timeline dependent on the landowner/developer)
- Supported by a number of technical studies










Land Use & Transportation Context



The neighbourhood plan will take into consideration adjacent and planned land uses and the transportation context, including:

- Ellerslie Road and the future Heritage Valley Trail are major regionally serving arterials.
- The neighbourhood is bordered by low density residential to the west and east
- Opportunities exist
 to connect with and
 enhance the multi-modal
 transportation network.

- + Capital Line LRT South
 Expansion will place three LRT
 stations in the general area,
 providing opportunities for
 transit driven development.
- The Government of Alberta
 is committed to the
 development of a Health
 Campus, with a mix of acute &
 ambulatory services based on
 community needs.
- + Heritage Valley Town Centre, a mixed-use commercial centre, will be located south of Heritage Valley 14, meeting a variety of community needs.



Neighbourhood Boundary



The neighbourhood plan will take into consideration adjacent and planned wildlife corridors and recreation context, including:

- A number of natural features that serve as important wildlife corridors, connecting the neighbourhood to Whitemud Ravine and the North Saskatchewan River Valley, including:
 - tree stand adjacent to Graydon Hill
 - pipeline corridor traversing the site
 - + Rosehill Cemetery; and
 - the agricultural areas north of Ellerslie Road.

- A variety of existing recreational opportunities in the surrounding areas, including:
 - Dog Park in Paisley
 - Shared use paths within pipeline corridors
 - Playground at Johnny Bright School Park in Rutherford
- The Heritage Valley

 District Park south of the neighbourhood, which will serve the Heritage Valley district and be home to a future Recreation Centre.







Healthy Community Lens & Policy

What is the Healthy Community movement?

The Healthy Community movement is spreading across Canada as a way to empower people to live healthy lives by improving their built environment.

What are some existing policies that promote a Healthy Community?

A new approach to neighbourhood planning

Draft Neighbourhood Plan Vision

Draft Neighbourhood Plan Themes

1 Social Inclusion & Safety



People of all backgrounds, ages, and abilities in this neighbourhood feel safe and included. They are able to contribute to their community and foster relationships that help them connect.







Contract of the Environmental Health



The neighbourhood incorporates an ecological network and sustainable development practices that enhance local biodiversity and contribute to climate change resilience.

People in the neighbourhood have equitable access to livable environments which enrich their well-being.

Local Economic Vitality



The neighbourhood is a vibrant complete community where all residents can live, work, shop, play, and thrive together.









Draft Neighbourhood Plan Highlights



This plan shows how the Neighborhood Plan is starting to take shape based on the Healthy Community vision, the neighborhood context, and the requirements of the new hospital and health campus.

Draft Neighbourhood Plan highlights:

- Wildlife corridors and connections are preserved through retention of tree stand and its connection to the pipeline corridor
- Multi-modal connectivity is maintained and enhanced, including direct links to transit.

- Transitional treatments
 will be explored where the
 neighbourhood is adjacent
 to low density residential.
- Parks and open space are designed to promote social connection, physical and mental well-being.
 They will be located with consideration to adjacent parks and open space.
- Encourage walkability and higher density in proximity to LRT stations.
- Facilitate integration of the future health campus with the LRT station and surrounding neighbourhood.
