4.1	Responding to Racism Against Black Muslim Women  - Joud Nour Eddin provided an overview of an event she attended called the Sisters Dialogue, which focused on the experiences of Muslim women:		
	<ul> <li>There is underreporting of violence against Black Muslim women due to fear of not being believed by the police and distrust in the justice system.</li> <li>There is a mental health toll on the victims and their families, and these hate crimes and hate incidents could amplify</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>previously experienced trauma.</li> <li>Research has shown that the global pandemic affects Black communities more because they are three times more likely to know someone who died from COVID.</li> <li>What is the role of the witness and allies? There needs to be a</li> </ul>		
	demand for change Some actions could include: - Awareness and education Safe places to report crimes and design the victim		
	services to address barriers.  - Provide specialized interventionists that understand the barriers to reporting crimes. These could be designed by people who have already experienced violence.  - Create a unified definition of hate crime.  - Form a working committee on Islamophobia. Create		
	strategic actions based on research and investigate other countries that have created policies and procedures against racism.  - Municipal and Federal governments could prioritize hate crime data.		
	<ul> <li>Discussions from other ARAC members:         <ul> <li>ARAC members have heard that there is a lack of trust to get help from other people when they are experiencing violence.</li> <li>Some ARAC members have worked directly with victims. Some of the victims feel that their voices have been silenced and they are an invisible group. Some community members would prefer</li> </ul> </li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>community strategies of education and prevention.</li> <li>The Shift Lab is searching for additional funds to create a workshop to help Black Musilm women reimagine safety at transit stations. There would be an overlap with other impacted communities. This training could be active bystander awareness.</li> <li>Who is responsible for bringing about change? Community? City Council?</li> </ul>		

- Councillor McKeen discussed an idea to bring forward a motion, in consultation from ARAC and Administration, which would involve:
  - Asking for a review of the City of Edmonton Public Places bylaw.
  - The bylaw has a provision which addresses the bullying and harassment of minors and the bylaw could be amended to address racism and Islamophobia and discriminiation based on sexual orientation and gender. The bylaw could make bigotry an offense and subject to fines.
  - A public hearing to change the bylaw would allow speakers to share their stories.
- Ways to make downtown a safe and welcoming space should be explored.
- Consultation needs to occur with people who are impacted the most.
  - Must ensure that women are provided with the opportunity to represent themselves and not have others speak for them during public discussions.
- Other possible actions:
  - ARAC Chair to draft a letter in support of Black Muslim women to send to Council.
  - Request group presentations to ARAC.
  - Form a working group or subcommittee to work on preventing hate crime or hate incidents.
  - Engage with Black Musilm women groups and encourage them to apply to the Anti-racism Grants program.
