



Upgrades coming to Parkdale traffic calming measures!

Improving Traffic Safety


Adaptable traffic calming measures were installed in **Parkdale** in fall 2024 to address traffic safety concerns such as speeding, shortcutting and other unsafe driving behaviours.

Opportunities to convert the installed adaptable traffic calming measures to permanent are reviewed and prioritized periodically at select locations. We're happy to share that several adaptable measures in Parkdale have been selected and will be converted to permanent measures. All other traffic calming measures in the neighbourhood will remain in place.

Adaptable traffic calming measures help the City to quickly improve road safety and adjust as needed. When these measures prove effective and budget allows, they are replaced with permanent asphalt or concrete solutions for long-term durability.



Planned Upgrades

Traffic calming measures outlined in the table below will be converted to permanent measures this construction season, starting in **summer 2026**, weather and resources permitting.

<p>What We're Upgrading Two-stage crossing:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 88 Street and 115 Avenue 	<p>Two-stage crossings can help:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Encourage slower vehicle speeds. ✓ Reduce pedestrian crossing distance. ✓ Increase pedestrian crossing opportunities, allowing people to cross one lane at a time. ✓ Improve visibility of people crossing the street. <p>The following rules apply to road users when approaching a two-stage crossing:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ People walking have the right of way when crossing. ✓ Drivers need to slow down and check for others. ✓ People biking or using a shared e-scooter must yield to vehicles and pedestrians before crossing one lane at a time. 	

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
