I am encouraged to find new and better ways to get things done.

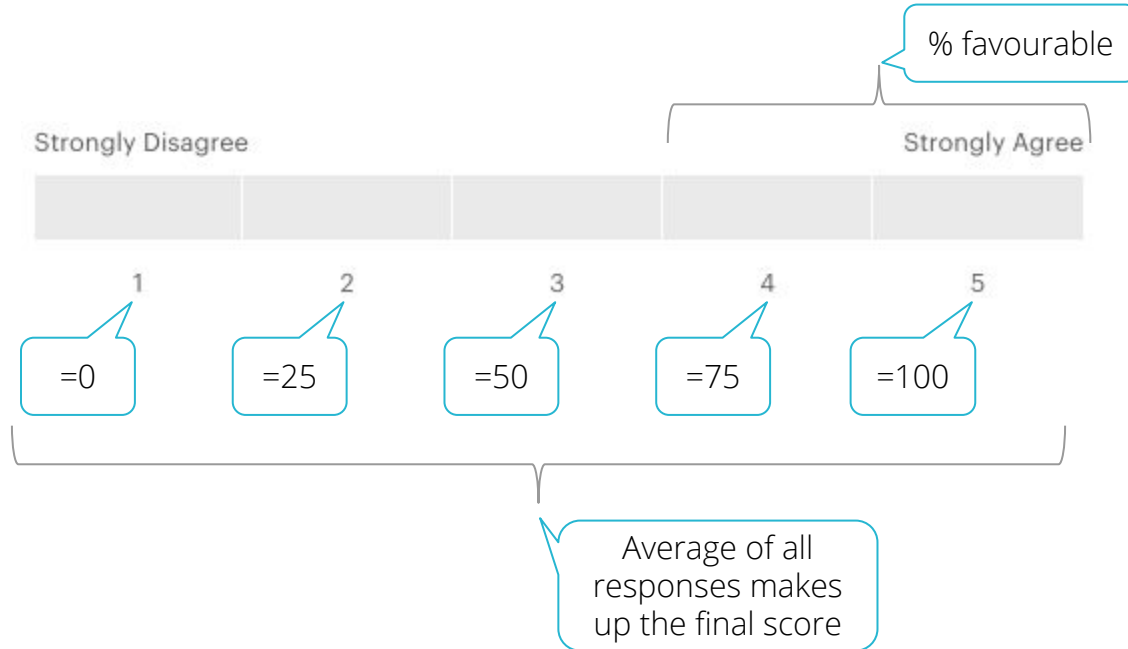
This is the “eSat”, which stands for the Glint Engagement & Satisfaction Score.
